The new clubs offered this year have had a positive impact on the profile of sport and increased the number of children taking part in physical activity on a daily basis.

The planning is also co-ordinated with the trust competition calendar, so this has allowed children to excel in a variety of sports, not only in lessons, but in competitive extracurricular opportunities and competitions as well.
