Dear Parent/Carer,

I hope that this letter finds you and your families well. I think it is fair to say that if we were to rewind to this time last year, none of us would have predicted the year that we have all endured. We have found ourselves wrestling with lockdown, isolation and uncertainty. For many, it has been both physically and mentally exhausting. As parents and carers, we have juggled our own personal circumstances, caring for our children and families, whilst attempting to maintain some sense of normality.

I want to thank all parents and carers for the support that you have given our school leaders, teachers and support staff since the beginning of the pandemic. I know for a fact that the warm messages and supportive emails that we have received over the year are genuinely appreciated by staff across the Trust. Our parents and carers play such an essential role in the life of the Trust. The support we receive enables us to offer the best education we can to the 3,800 children across our family of eight schools in the town. I am writing to express my personal thanks; it means a great deal.

The Trust continues to go from strength to strength, and I would expect this to be the case as we continue into 2021. There has been some fantastic work carried out this year both inside and outside of the classroom, and our termly magazine Achieve highlights some of this work. Additionally, the Trust Strategic Plan sets out the flight path as we see it for the next three years. We aim to build on the significant progress that our schools have made over the last few years. As CEO of the Trust, I know that our improvement journey never ends as we can always do more. I do hope that we can count on your support on our journey to deliver on our plan.
